


BOOK CLUB GUIDE

About the Book:

Discussion Questions:

- 4. What did you learn in the book that you didn't know before?

- 7. How would you describe this book to a friend you wish to recommend it to?
- 8. Should youth be singled out for their accomplishments? Why or why not?
- 9. Did the author do a good job of telling the girls' stories? Why or why not?
- 10. What other books by this author have you read? How did they compare to this book?

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
